A Blessed Sunday to you all on this our parish festival weekend,

I want to thank each one of you who have in some way helped to bring this event once again into being. If you didn't get called, please come and help in the dining room. A special thanks too for all those that have either worked hard at the raffle and/or at selling tickets.

Right now, we still depend upon the chicken dinner for a good chunk of our annual budget and income, until we all pitch in a little more on our weekly giving (again, if we'd all just give about \$2.00 more a week, we'd be able to use the festival money for something besides operating costs). Speaking of our budget, we've come to the close of the fiscal year and are in the process of setting our budget for next year. We had a few major expenses this year (temporary roof repairs, the church floor basement, a new copy machine after 10 years to name some of them), but our income has remained steady, which is adequate in these economic times.

Your generosity has helped in many ways to save money here and at the same time to build community. All the new vestments, for instance, that you see, have all been donated to me or to the Church. I haven't spent any Holy Rosary funds on those. That goes also for the reliquaries seen around the Church (which were a special needs donation from the extraordinary form) as well as the sedilia (that three-seated bench I sit on), nor any money for the new statues that were donated. Someone has just agreed to donate new carpet runners for the altars and the sanctuary. We managed to cut about \$10,000 in our heat expenses this past year in various ways. People have been wonderful in their donations also for the payment of the back stairs, now beautifully stained and redone (as well as the labor to do them), and to donations towards the flowers throughout the year. A great deal of the cassocks and surplices were donated or found in closets here at Holy Rosary, the whole flower garden outside the Church was a beautiful donation, the Holy Rosary sign refurbishing was a gift, and so much of the work in the convent has been donated both through supplies and people's work time. And don't forget the large amount of money that the parish saves through the great effort of a few who clean the Church each week (please come and help with this—it should be a group effort), the mowing and grounds upkeep, and various maintenance issues that constantly appear. We save thousands of dollars due to your generosity and you should be proud, as we can't afford to pay for all these jobs. But truly, much of this is done by a very few. Many more of us should take more ownership of your parish and help out. There are always ways to help—so don't feel that you have nothing to give! I think many don't realize how unique it is to have a parish like this where people really take an interest in making the Church their own—to take pride in it and not expect someone else to do the job.

For those of you that are new and those that have asked about what happens to the Extraordinary Form offering—30% of the funds go directly to the parish—as set up under Bishop Cooney—which is a great help. Of the remaining 70%, some goes toward my salary, some to a good portion of the candle expenses, flowers, and many of the things listed above, as well as hymnals, and things for the extraordinary form.

I look forward to writing again soon about how the festival went. Let's make it a great success, along with the whole parish, spiritually and temporally (materially) as we head into this year of planning for a potential capital campaign!
